# June / Cucumbers

### INTRODUCTION

Over the next few weeks, we will be learning about a kind of food that we grow in Kansas. I'm going to give you some clues to see if you can guess what this food is.

- · This vegetable grows on long creeping vines.
- They have fuzzy leaves
- They are green on the outside and white on the inside
- They contain a lot of water and are a good snack to keep you hydrated
- Their skins contain vitamins A and C
- People eat this vegetable raw in slices or in salads.
- They can also be made into pickles.
- · Show picture.

Can you guess what food I'm talking about? We will be learning about Cucumbers!

**Optional:** You could also place a cucumber in a brown paper bag and let the children reach in and feel it without peeking to see if they can guess what it might be as you give the clues.

### **ENGAGE**

To engage students with the science of cucumbers, begin by showing them a variety of cucumbers: different sizes, colors, and varieties. Have students complete a notice/wonder chart to record their observations and potential questions they might have. Once students have had a chance to do this solo, partner or group them up and have them refine their wonderings into scientific questions. Have groups of students share their questions on a Driving Question Board.

### **EXPLORE**

It is time for students to conduct research with the goal of answering one or more of their research questions. To facilitate this step, curate a list of websites, videos, magazine articles, or experimental findings that students can use. These materials can be organized into stations for student to "move to," or digital slide decks that are good for limited space or lessons taught asynchronously. It is important that students first decide what they want to find, and then organize their findings to track their progress. A progress tracker can be as simple as a t-chart with the question on one side, and the student's key take-aways from each station on the other.

### **EXPLAIN**

At this stage of the lesson, students should be prepared to make a claim to answer their chosen research question. To engage students in discussion consider using a scientist circle<sup>3</sup>.
